## ASSESSMENT & FEEDBACK



A Rep collected feedback from her cohort regarding a tight deadline, after which an extension was granted to allow students more time to complete their work.



Final year Reps worked with staff to obtain clearer guidelines published on SurreyLearn for the dissertation assignment for their cohort.



For a cohort in FASS, feedback from a previous assessment was released earlier to enable students to improve their understanding ahead of another deadline.

## CHANGES TO COURSES



A Rep provided feedback from their cohort to staff who made several crucial improvements to the running of the course, including timetabling and resources on SurreyLearn.



A Veterinary Medicine Course Rep has secured mock MCQ and exam questions for the cohort in order to aid revision and preparation for exams.



A Rep in Electronic Engineering has raised the concerns of their cohort regarding lab marking consistency. The cohort has now reported an increase in lab quality.
